JURY REPORT LEO WAAIJERS OPEN SCIENCE AWARD 2024

PURPOSE OF THE AWARD

The Award is intended for an individual or group that has taken a bold, innovative and/or impactful initiative in the field of Open Science in recent years. The aim of the award is to highlight Open Science initiatives and thereby encourage and inspire others. For this Award, we asked for nominations to be submitted. Everyone could nominate; self-nominations were allowed.

IN THE FOOTSTEPS OF LEO WAAIJERS

Leo Waaijers (1938 - 2023) was a tireless fighter for Open Access and for restoring the balance of power between public and private actors in the scientific domain. Leo was very active in the scientific information world for 35 years, bombarding it with innovative ideas, proposals and action plans. He did this from various positions, including as university librarian at TU Delft and at Wageningen University & Research, as manager at the SURF platform ICT and research, as Open Access consultant and employee of the CWTS. Leo scored national and international acclaim for setting up the successful 'Cream of Science', an initiative to give a quality boost to universities' Open Access repositories by asking 200 leading scientists to make all their scientific publications available for it. After this, Leo turned his attention to the scientific publishing process itself and founded QOAM - intended to let the quality of a journal be determined by the authors themselves and thus break the dominance of the 'journal impact factor'. Tireless as ever, he and CWTS colleagues published another plea to build a publishing infrastructure outside publishers two months before his unexpected death. With the Leo Waaijers Award, UKB wants to inspire others to follow in his footsteps.

TWENTY NOMINATIONS FOR THE 2024 AWARD

The existence of the new Award was announced in May 2024 on the UKB website and also communicated to university library directors, Open Science coordinators of time and through the judges' personal networks. This resulted in 21 nominations with 2 nominations for the same initiative.

Of the 20 nominations, six were for individuals, five of whom were researchers. The remaining nominations were for initiatives undertaken by multiple individuals. Two

nominations concerned Diamond Open Access publishing, two nominations concerned citizen science initiatives. In terms of subject matter, most nominations were about FAIR and Open Research Data, Open-Source software code and its reuse. We would like to highlight a special initiative: a fund that finances research that reuses existing research data.

The jury found all nominations valuable, which did not make the choice for the shortlist and the final award winner any easier. The judges independently scored all nominations on the aforementioned 4 criteria and then discussed all nominations.

Three nominations emerged: two researchers with extraordinary initiatives and a group of developers with potentially highly impactful applications.

The jury would like to underline the CWTS arguments for this: the use of open data makes the results transparent and creates a level playing field for researchers in countries that cannot use the expensive commercial databases.'
